She battled through constant interruptions from children at home and a lousy internet connection that kept dropping out so that she could stay in class and learn a little more English and hear the devotions from God's Word. She kept it up from September to March, and when we finally returned to inperson classes in April, she was there! She took her placement exam in May, did well enough to advance to the next level of English class, and is continuing her study of English at Casa this fall. Grit. Perseverance. Long-suffering. Victory!





There is a victory like that behind each of the numbers in this report. Whether it be the youngest children in the Early Childhood Education program, or the 1st-3rd graders in After School Reading, or the adults in our English and computer literacy classes, each of these students and their families persevered through a very difficult year and found a way to advance. ADULT EDUCATION

From the start of class in the fall until the beginning of April 2021, our English as a Second Language classes on Zoom provided important social interaction for isolated students. Then, starting in April of 2021 we where able to have in-person classes again. This provided a great platform for our new Summer reading class that covered the Gospel of John.

- ESL served 110 students.
- 56% of graduating students
 advanced a level

ELEMENTARY LITERACY

Having made a big impact during the summer of 2020 through Summer at the Lake, our After School Reading program was also virtual. Parents report that the program helped their children to grow in their reading abilities and also helped with their "self-esteem," "confidence," and "spiritual support."

- We had 57 children in Summer at the Lake 2020.
- 17 children particiapted in After School Reading.


EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

We started out the year virtually and eventually moved to in-person classes. It was a challenge to engage pre-kindergartners virtually, but our staff did a great job under difficult circumstances. By the end of the year, the children showed great progress in the areas we track: math, writing and reading, and social and emotional development.

- ECE served 13 children.
- The majority of children were able to write their name, recognize letters, know the numbers 0-9, and turn pages in a book.

COVID RESPONSE

In response to the economic impacts of the COVID pandemic, Casa del Lago found itself engaging the Bachman Lake community in new ways. One of those ways was in regular food distributions throughout the year working with our partners Brighter Bites and Park Cities Presbyterian Church.

• After several months of lockdown due to COVID, Henry came to Casa del Lago for our Early Childhood Education program. Henry was not used to seeing new people or kids, and seeing strangers caused him anxiety. Henry would come to class and go under the tables or hide behind the doors. Our staff began to work hand in hand with Henry's mother, giving her recommendations to work on at home. She followed all the recommendations and was very consistent in her class attendance. One of the recommendations that we gave her was to start routines at home to help Henry anticipate what will happen next, and make transitions easier for him. By the end of the school year, Henry was arriving ready every day, following the routine and doing all the work in class. Henry worked hard, made progress and really enjoyed class!

Jesús asked if his teachers would stay on the call, because his mom had something that she wanted to say to them. She got on and expressed so much gratitude to the teachers, and to all of Casa del Lago. Jesús' teacher at school says that he has improved so much, and is reading really well. He wants to read all the time! He even found RAZ Kids books that he read in After School on his school computer so he could keep reading them at school as well. His mother was so happy and grateful!
